Fun Sunflower Facts

1. THEY'RE NATIVE TO THE AMERICAS. They were cultivated in North America as far back as 3000 BCE, when they were developed for food, medicine, dye, and oil. They were exported to the rest of the world by Spanish conquistadors around 1500.

2. THEY WERE BROUGHT TO RUSSIA BY

ROYALTY. Tsar Peter the Great was so fascinated by the sunny flowers he saw in the Netherlands that he took some back to Russia. They became popular when people discovered that sunflower seed oil was not banned during Lent, unlike the other oils the Russian Orthodox Church banned.

3. THEY TRACK THE SUN. Sunflowers plants display a behavior called heliotropism. The flower buds and young blossoms will face east in the morning and follow the sun as the earth moves during the day.

4. THE WORLD'S TALLEST SUNFLOWER REACHES 30 FEET AND 1 INCH. In the summer of 2014, Veteran green-thumb Hans Peter Schiffer toppled the Guinness World Record for a third year in a row.

5. THEY HAVE TRAVELED TO SPACE. In 2012, U.S. astronaut Don Pettit brought along a few companions to the International Space Station: sunflower seeds. Petit regularly blogged about his budding friendship and shared photos of the gardening process.

6. THEY ARE ACTUALLY THOUSANDS OF TINY FLOWERS. Each sunflower's head is made of smaller flowers. The petals we see around the outside are called ray florets, and they cannot reproduce. But the disc florets in the middle, where the seeds develop, have both male and female sex organs, and each produce a seed. They can self-pollinate or take pollen blown by the wind or transported by insects.
