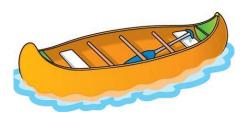
Learn what makes new member Christy Davis tick.

Doug Hoffman from MGA joined board members **Pam Fitch, Jane Cacich, Ruthie Pallow and Cheryl Nordby** to look over our course condition and issues.



The work on Hole **#**7 has started. They are going to be working on the side of the fairway, up by the green along with redoing the entire hole. There is a temporary green just in front of the current tee box. We tee off from the black men's tees so the yardage for this hole is approximately 100 yards.

We know most of you will want to climb that darn fence and play the hole as usual. That would not be wise. We'd have to turn you in to **Bob** in the clubhouse. And that would not be pretty.



Doug recommended making #9 a 90yard par 3. Hitting over the swampy area in the middle of the fairway was becoming a real source of contention for many of us.



On hole #8 green, you can move your ball out of any divots made by people hitting off the green. You can also move your ball, no closer to the hole, if one of those divots is in your line of putting. **Pat Pederson** and **Pam Fitch** ignore the caterpillar in the background as they contemplate making par puts on #8.

The Capitol Regional Watershed District is directing the work. Below is what is happening to hole 7 fairway:

"An existing storm sewer pipe near the fairway of Hole 7 captures runoff from 63-acres of land including the zoo and surrounding neighborhood. Water from the pipe will be diverted to an infiltration basin, similar to a large rain garden, and an underground infiltration system. Polluted rainwater will fill the basin and any excess water will flow into a series of underground pipes with thousands of holes in them to allow the water to soak into the ground. Native plants in the basin will soak up water, provide pollinator habitat, and enhance the beauty of the area. The water is cleaned as it moves through the soil, removing pollutants that would have otherwise ended up in Como Lake."
